March 8th Meeting

The March speaker will be audiologist **Larry Stephenson** of Newport Audiology Centers. Larry will be speaking about ototoxic medicines, the basic anatomy of the structures of the ear, which can be affected by ototoxic drugs and the signs of ototoxicity. He will also discuss the monitoring of hearing while taking ototoxic drugs (such as some chemo-therapy formulas).

Larry is a licensed audiologist who practices for Newport Audiology in the Washington area. He holds a Masters Degree from the University of South Florida, where he graduated in 1996. His interests at the University level were focused on assessment and remediation of hearing loss in pediatric and adult populations. He is also credentialed by the American Speech-Language Hearing Association. Accompanying Larry will be

Ototoxic Drugs Can they affect your ears?

Did you know that there are 820 drugs that can damage your ears?

There is abysmal ignorance on the part of both health care professionals and the general population concerning the many prescription drugs that can indeed damage our ears. In fact, ototoxic drugs are so far removed from the stream of human consciousness that the word is not even listed in most dictionaries!

We call drugs that damage our ears ototoxic (OH-toe-TOKS-ick) drugs. Ototoxic just means ear (oto) poisoning (toxic). These drugs typically either damage the hair cells in the cochlea, the hair cells in the balance (vestibular) system of our inner ears or our auditory nerves. Side effects of ototoxic drugs may include such things as temporary or permanent hearing loss; deafness; tinnitus; dizziness; vertigo; and hypersensitivity to sounds.

There are many drugs that are ototoxic to some degree. For example, taking 6 to 8 aspirin a day can cause ringing in your ears (tinnitus) and temporary hearing loss. Some drugs will quickly and permanently damage your ears. You may be left with little or no hearing. Other drugs can have both temporary and permanent effects.

Always ask your doctor or pharmacist about the possible side effects of any medications (or combinations of medications) you are taking. Have your doctor look these drugs up in their "drug bible" and **show** you.

Just because a drug is listed as being ototoxic doesn't necessarily mean you ears will be damaged by taking it—but be warned—it may. Each person's body is slightly different and reacts differently.
