Subject: Telecoil (T-switch) on your hearing aids. They are not just for phones!

We will be talking about the Telecoil on your hearing aids and what you can use them for besides the telephone.

Most behind-the-ear hearing aids routinely come with telecoil sensors, as do many in-the-ear hearing aids. These are the hearing aids typically worn by those with the most profound loss, those most in need of hearing assistance. A show of hands at the Self-Help for Hard of Hearing People convention revealed that nearly all who had hearing aids, had telecoils.

Currently about 90 percent of British hearing aids have telecoils. A lesser, but apparently growing, percent of American hearing aids have telecoils. The percentage of people with telecoils will naturally rise as they become more useful.

Come to the meeting. We will demonstrate with our FM loop system, using neckloops and silhouettes.

From our Last Meeting

Preventative hearing loss for our troops

One very fascinating piece of evidence that has been discovered here within the last year, that affects a dramatic number of people, is noise induced hearing loss. It really comes to mind during now, with our armed services serving our country over in Iraq. The amount of noise exposure that our military suffers is phenomenal. Over this whole encounter, this 30 days of war—hopefully—we're going to incur 22 billion dollars worth of cost for hearing loss suffered from our service members.

If you are riding around in a Bradley Troop Carrier for an hour, you're at significant risk for hearing loss. These guys ride in them for 24 hours.

When you're in the battle field you're not wearing hearing protection. You can't say, "Wait until I put my ear plugs in before we start shooting." So they not only risk their lives but also risk their hearing.

Amazingly enough, research has found that by taking a special medication before you go into battle or before the noise exposure, you have a dramatic decrease in the affects of the noise. It's interesting: it's the same kind of medication that is being proposed for the prevention of heart muscle damage. There's all this talk about anti-oxidants; that medication is used to protect the ear from damage.

An otolaryngologist, a friend of mine, is doing a lot of research, and is using this medication in Iraq to prevent damage. It's a commonly available prescription medication. That's good news in the area of research on prevention of hearing loss.

Our Real-time Captioner Else Meek

For 12 years, Else Meek has volunteered her time and equipment to caption for our meetings. She has been wonderful to us. She has kept us in the communication loop by almost instantaneously showing on the screen what a speaker is saying. Some of us use it to glance at for missed words, others rely on it constantly.

Realtime Captioning, (or CART - *Communication Access Realtime Translation*) which is similar to court stenography, is the simultaneous process

through which spoken-word English becomes readable English. A highly skilled Captionist, like Else Meek, using the aid of cutting-edge computer software, listens and takes down all spoken communication in steno shorthand. The computer then reinterprets the Captionist's shorthand into readable English, which it displays on a computer monitor, television screen, video, or overhead projector (which we use), or other type of audiovisual device. The communication is almost instantaneous and fluid. Because all communication is processed through the Captionist's computer in word processing format, disked transcripts are always available and ready for email transmission, incorporation into a database, or printing. Else always has the disk ready for us and we use it as our meeting minutes. (At times Else has e-mailed us the transcripts of our meeting.)

Realtime Captioning is often the preferred option for deaf, hard of hearing and late-deafened individuals, and persons who do not use sign language as their primary mode of communication. For these people, Realtime Captioning is the most effective and reasonable accommodation. Realtime Captioning has also been found to be the service of choice for anyone physically unable to take notes or unable to concentrate on classroom work and take notes at the same time, such as individuals with CAPD (Central Auditory Processing Disorder)

For years, Else has come to our meetings, set up her stenography machine, her computer, and projector, and sat down to listen attentively to everything that comes her way. The words seemingly go from her ears right out of her fingers, which are flying on her stenography machine, right onto the screen where we can see and read as our speaker talks. The amazing part is that it just takes seconds to display what the speaker has said.

Not only does Else volunteer her time with us, she also does it for other SHHH chapters, WASA-SHHH, the University of Washington's "Ears, Hearing and Beyond Conferences" and Virginia Mason's, "Listen for Life" Conference, as well as many other organizations. We even saw her fingers go a mile a minute at the SHHH International Convention in Seattle last summer.

Thank you Else so much for helping us! We really appreciate it!

The next time you see Else, let her know how much you appreciate her. In fact, we are collecting cash and sending a card around the room to show her how much we care.
