Exciting Service-Filled Time for Sight and Hearing Foundation

There are exciting times for the Northwest Lions Foundation for Sight & Hearing, the Lions Early Assessment Program (LEAP) is successful to date beyond their reasonable expectation; Golden ears days is receiving a large boost with a celebrity spokesperson, aiding the fundraiser. The Lions Affordable hearing Aid project is beginning clinical trials at Harborview Hospital, and to top it all off, the Lions Eye Bank continues to expand its sight-giving services and has forced expansion of the Foundation offices in the Cabrini Towers in Seattle. We in District 19B are justifiably proud of their continuing association with and support of the Foundation.


The LEAP Program was started as a three-year program aimed at universal infant hearing screening for live births in hospital in the State of Washington. Before the start of the program, Washington was 50th out of 52 reporting entities (we were ahead of Puerto Rico and the District of Columbia) in percentage of infants whose hearing was screened at birth

At birth. With the program a little over a year old, they have moved to low 30's, a significant improvement. But even more important, the Department of Social and Health Services has decided to make hearing screening one of the mandatory tests each hospital must run on new-born to retain their state accreditation. The legislature will be asked for necessary funding to implement the program in all hospitals. This is a prime case of leading by example. The Lions lobbied the legislature and the DSHS without success prior to deciding to implement the program on our own. With our own program well on the way and showing significant improvement in the number of infants tested, the state decided it was time to take the very necessary step of complete implementation of the testing program. This will also free the unused portion of the funding for other necessary programs. Good Work Lions

Amanda Beers, the current Miss Washington and a candidate for Miss America, has agreed to be the spokesperson for the Foundation's annual Golden Ears fund raising drive. Miss Beers, who was born with a significant hearing impairment has a platform as a Miss America candidate that reads like Lions plan for helping the hearing impaired. Her main goals are making sure each newborn child has his/ her hearing screen at birth and that every person in this state that needs hearing aids can get them, whether through insurance or through state aid. Her presentation at the August 21st meeting of the University Lions demonstrated how much help she will be. This was the beginning for Everett SHHH. When determining who was willing to accept the various responsibilities, Anna Kinch volunteered to become our first treasurer. 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bills paid and donations entered. If ever we detected an error, she kindly asked for an explanation and corrected if needed. Anna held the job as treasurer for about 4-5 years. Anna was already in her early 80s when I first met her. One vivid memory I have of her, was her full embrace of living life to the fullest. Though I was more than 30 years younger than Anna, she would usually insist on picking ME up to drive to the meetings. When asked why she did this, her reply usually was: " Ursula. I still want to feel like I can contribute!"

I have valued Anna's friendship over the years, as well as her gentle and caring spirit. Those memories will continue to Live.

Communication Suggestions for those with Hearing Loss

Even with the best-fitted hearing aids there will be times when you misunderstood what someone has said. To minimize the frustrations, that may occur when this happens, try the following.

- Noisy areas can create difficult listening situation, even for those with normal hearing. When possible, turn off competing sounds sources (TV, radio, dishwasher, or running water., etc.) or move away from the sound source. If your hearing aids have directional microphones, position yourself so that sound distractions are behind you.
- Strive for a clear view of the speaker's face. An optimal distance for communication exchange is three to six feet. Position yourself so that the speaker's face is well lit and so that the light is not in your eyes. Watch the speaker's face for expressions and lip movements that can add to the meaning of what you hear.
- the speaker why you misunderstood so that the message is not repeated in the same fashion. For example....."Please raise your voice a bit"..."Please repeat that a bit more slowly, etc." As a courtesy to your speakers, provide guidance so that they do not need to repeat the full message.
- Write out important information. Instructions, or key words such as addresses, telephone numbers, measurements, dollar figures and so on, should be written to avoid confusion.
- **Do not Bluff**—Bluffing robs you of your opportunities to practice good communication skills. Not informing others about your hearing loss increases the occurrence of misinterpretations and the possibility of damaged relationship.

Communication Suggestions When speaking to someone with Hearing Loss

Hearing aids, while very helpful, may not solve all communication problems. When difficulties persist, try these suggestions.

- Get the listener's attention first before you speak. Saying the person's name and waiting for a response can greatly decrease the need for repetitions,.
- Speak clearly and decrease your speech to a slow-normal rate to allow the listener to "catch up" Pausing between sentences can also be helpful. The best distance for effective communication is three to six feet.
- **Do Not Shout**. Shouting actually can distort the signal in the listener's ears. Be sure the listener has a clear view of your face so that facial expressions and lip movements are visible and speak slightly louder than normal.
- Rephrase rather than offering a repetition. Quite often, the same one or two words in a sentence will continue to be misheard with each repetition. Rephrasing eliminates many frustrations.
- Avoid conversation if the television or radio is playing, the dishwasher is running, and so on.

 Noisy distractions can create difficult listening situation even for those with normal hearing. Always invite the person with a hearing loss to a quieter side of the room, or turn off the noise distractions.
- Remain patients, positive and relaxed. Communication can be difficult sometimes. When communications partners become impatient, negative and tense, communication will become more difficult. When in doubt, ask the person with hearing loss for suggestions of ways to be better understood.
